Training — RNLD's Documenting and Revitalising Indigenous Languages (DRIL) Program offers a new training method to Aboriginal and Islander people in mainland communities and Indigenous organisations who want to develop, run and manage their own language projects.

Features

- one-to-one or small group training with your family, in the community, or at work
- intensive on-site workshops — we come to you
- no previous experience or special skills are needed
- no workshop fees for participants
- tailored to individual ability, needs and interests
- flexible training modules: start at any point and choose topics as your skills build and interests change
- freely available training materials, updated regularly to take into account new developments in the field
- increases autonomy and sustainability

Curriculum — DRIL now offers 29 modules within the following topics:

- Creating language resources
- Strategies for language revival and maintenance
- Literacy and linguistics

- Training and curriculum development

Education and employment — DRIL strengthens learning and offers a transition to further education. It prepares you for employment in community language activities and in government departments and Aboriginal organisations, such as arts and culture centres, Aboriginal language centres, school and community based language programs, interpreting and translating, and Indigenous publishing.
